Spotlight on Member... Sylvia Moore

The photo was taken in a school house in S. Dakota where Laura I. Wilder attended.

Daughter Mimi Moore says, "She loved her career as an Elementary School Supervisor, but one newspaper article that I read quoted her as saying "even though she has received many professional accolades, Moore considers her four children her proudest accomplishment".



Sylvia Sheaks Moore, a native of New Market, graduated from Mary Washington College of the University of Virginia in 1948 with a B.A. in English. She taught English at New Market HS for four years and then took leave of the education field for 13 years to raise her four children with husband, Joe. She received her Masters in Education from Madison College (JMU) in 1968 and pursued post graduate studies at Geneseo State University of NY and UVA. For seven years, Sylvia was Title I reading teacher in the elementary schools of northern Rockingham Co., leaving that position at Plains Elementary School in 1972 to become Elementary Supervisor in Rockingham Co. until retirement in 1989. While in that capacity, Sylvia served as coordinator of Social Studies K-12, supervisor of English/Language Arts K-12, and coordinator of programs for the gifted. These included a regional Governor's School and popular summer programs for elementary and middle school students. She also served as a consultant with the Virginia Dept. of Education in the development and assessment of the Standards of Learning for Social Studies, and in 1984 chaired the state textbook adoption committee for elementary social studies (Silver Burdette's Virginia History and Geography ,1985, a 4th grade social studies text and Macmillan/McGraw-Hill's Virginia, the World Around Us ,1991). She also coordinated Rockingham Co. Schools' United States Bicentennial studies and commemorations.

Sylvia was the first woman president of the Virginia Consortium of Social Studies Supervisors and College Educators (VCSSCE) 1983-84 and received the annual "Friend to Education" award in 1984 from the Virginia Council for the Social Studies. Other professional affiliations included Delta Kappa Gamma Society International of key women educators, AAUW and Phi Delta Kappa. She was president of Beta Xi chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, 1982-84, and served on most of the chapter's committees while an active member. She attended the Golden Gift Leadership-Management Seminar in Austin, Texas in 1983. She served as Iota State Parliamentarian 1985-87 and was chairman of the Professional Development Seminar in 1988. Sylvia also was chairman of Iota State Long Range Planning Committee and the Personnel Committee. She was a member of the State Scholarship Committee for two biennium. She served as President of Valley Supervisors and received the Administrator of the Year award in 1989 by Greater Madison, Inc.

Sylvia was a charter member and twice president of the Cohee Garden Club in New Market where she was also a lifetime member of Reformation Lutheran Church. She served four three year terms on the Church Council and co-chaired the Bicentennial Committee. She was a member of the team in charge of designing the stained glass windows. Sylvia served on the Executive Board of Directors for Shenandoah Memorial Hospital and was an active member of the New Market High School Alumni Association (Class of 1944), attending most of the reunions until three years ago.

After a very rewarding career, Sylvia retired in June 1989 from 23 years of teaching and supervising elementary education in Rockingham Co. Schools. She then enjoyed a part-time job as supervisor of student teachers for JMU. During retirement she traveled widely to 24 foreign countries, including three trips with Global Volunteers to teach English to children in Poland, Crete and Turkey.

In April 2000, she moved from her home of 50 years north of New Market to the retirement community of VMRC where she was active on many committees and President of the Resident's Council for one year. A lifelong gardener, Sylvia started an adopt-a-plot resident gardening program and maintained her flower bed outside the back door until she was 88! She enjoyed participating in two book groups (one Delta Kappa Gamma's) and started a poetry read group at Park Gables. For several years she was a volunteer reader to special needs students at Plains Elementary School. She served on the Shenandoah Valley Bach Festival Board of Directors. Sylvia was also an active participant in the Life Long Learning Institute for many years and attended Senior College brown bag lunch classes at JMU.

In 2011, Sylvia completed the last trip on her bucket list when her daughter, Mimi, and friend took her on the Laura Ingalls Wilder Trail through Wisconsin, Iowa, S. Dakota and Minnesota. Being a former teacher, she enjoyed visiting as many one room school houses as possible across the midwest!
